There's a great poem in Ecclesiastes 3. It's all about time and the seasons of our lives.

Ecclesiastes 3:1 (NRSV)

3 For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

The rock band *The Birds* made this poem into a popular song a generation ago. This song speaks to the different time—the seasons that come into our live. They are days of building and some times of conflicts in our lives. Seems like time comes around for everything both good and bad and in between over the years.

The Fourth of July is a wonderful and particularly American holiday...it's a day to remember just one of the many seasons in our nation's past. Other nations celebrate their own days of independence, in Mexico it's Cinco de Mayo, in Norway it's Syttende Mai. Our 4th of July celebration are unique because our story as a nation—how we gained our independence is unique.

There was a season—a time of great conflict between the United States and Great Britain.
