

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Freedom and Reformation

Right at the end of October Lutherans remember something distinctly their own—Reformation Day. I had now idea about Reformation Sunday in my Catholic childhood. It was news to me as a 19 year old wandering into Central Lutheran Church in Winona, MN. I knew a little about Martin Luther—but I was about to discover the way Lutheran's remember this young priest and his message of freedom in Christ.

Biographers tell us that Martin Luther grew up the son of a prosperous miner. Martin's father hoped he would become a lawyer—but Martin made a promise to God in the middle of the thunderstorm. He pledged his life to God as a friar—praying to St Anne that he would be saved from the lightening.

Martin was a good student—and he followed the direction of his teachers—but he found no peace for his soul. He did everything his religious superiors taught. He followed all the rules in worship and in his life as a brother and later as a priest. But the longer Martin stayed in the Augustinian cloister the more he wrestled with his deep feelings of sin and unworthiness. One of Martin Luther's teachers said he should study scripture. Picture a 20 something man with an intense sense of guilt. Luther's troubled conscience was on fire. This young man could see every flaw and sin. As hard as he tried Martin never found peace with God—that is until he started reading the New Testament.

As Martin read Paul's letters and Jesus' words in the gospels he discovered the Good News—that Jesus came to set sinners free by faith. Martin learned that real freedom came to earth in the flesh and blood person of Jesus. Martin's fears and troubles found relief in Jesus.

Some say the Martin Luther and the Reformation is just ancient history, but the need for freedom in Christ remains today just like it did for Luther. Today people still believe they need to be perfect to earn God's love—today people believe they have to earn God's grace. The need for the Gospel is still very real in our world today—and that's why Martin Luther's message still matters.

This month we will remember Martin Luther and his call to reformation and as we remember let's give thanks that we have good news for hurting souls. Martin's message rings out loud today. There is freedom in Christ that comes from faith. We can't earn our freedom; Jesus gives it freely to us by faith. As a believer inside the church today I see the Reformation message as the freedom message troubled souls need today.

The message of Freedom in Christ mattered above all for Luther. He and the other reformers gladly risked their lives to preach to the world. Luther's goal was helping troubled consciences find peace in Jesus.

May we remember the freedom we have in Jesus – and may God help us learn to share that freedom with the people of our generation.

Read John 8:1-11

What does this story have to teach us about freedom?

How is this story Good News for sinners?

Jesus came to set sinners totally free. Free from sin, free from death, free from the Devil. The moment God can do the most good for us is the moment we can do the least for ourselves.

Read John 8:31-33 Many religious people in Jesus' day believed they had no sins holding them back, but Jesus said he came to make them free.

What are the sins that cling to us that we don't see?

Why did they say "We have never been slaves?"

Read John 8:34-36 What does it mean to be slave to sin?

What does it mean to have a permanent place in God's family?
